

MEMORANDUM

Determination and certification of election femults, and declaration

It is imperative that the Commission's determination, certification and evaluation of election results should be final and not subject to appeal or review by any court or the Special Electoral Court. There must be finality as to the certification of the election results. This must happen relatively—soon. The South African society is a volatile one. The effect of drawn-out uncertainty on the outcome should be avoided at all costs. It will result in an escalation of violence.

Experience of other countries

- Namibia's certification was by UNTAG. No appeal.
 Outcome accepted by DTA despite criticism of voting
 in Ovamboland. This brought peace.
- In Nigeria the recent election results declared void violence followed. The unpreparedness to accept the final verdict of the democratic process was the real reason why the results were contested.

That is also the final test here: Will the finality of the democratic decision be accepted? If yes - then plan for a process which will ensure free and fair elections.

Irregularities during campaigning should be addressed and remedied then. It should not be possible for any party to use them as excuses for not accepting the results. Is there adequate provision in the bill for such control and remedies? We feel that the machinery is provided for through the Special Electoral Tribunals, Electoral Appeal

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Tribunals and especially the Special Electoral Court. The latter is appointed by the Transitional Council and not the IEC; it will consist of judges from the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, the Supreme Court, as well as a suitable expert and it has the power to review any decision of the Commission. This means that the action and procedure of the IEC can be effectively checked and therefore the certification sust be final.

If there is still a lack of trust among parties, it can only be addressed by creating legitimate, independent and competent structures - not by contesting the outcome.

In the light of the above, we request that the following should be given serious consideration:

- To address the problem of lack of trust, and to make sure that the IEC remains independent, we request that the requirement which was omitted in the fourth draft be revived. If we insisted that every member of the IEC was only eligible if he/she did not hold any political or public office 18 months prior to his/her appointment, it may go a long way to address fears and lack of trust of parties.
- We still feel that the decision to restrict membership of the Commission to those who give up all other employment may well mean that appropriate people are excluded. While we understand that the Commissioners will have to give almost exclusive attention to this task, there may be some examples (such as senior church leaders) where a person may not be able to relinquish all other responsibilities.

In the light of the above, clause 6(1)(a) and (b) of the fourth draft, with regard to the conduct required of members, should read as follows:

- 6(1) Every member of the Commission shall -
 - (a) be appointed in her/his individual capacity, and shall, notwithstanding any personal opinion, preference or party affiliation, serve impartially and independently and perform her or his functions in good faith and without fear, favour, bias or prejudice;
 - (b) serve in full-time capacity;

(c) within 30 days

- Because of the urgency of their task and time constraints that exist, we still recommend that consideration be given to the appointment of between three to five alternate (reserve) members for the IEC. They would have to attend meetings but not have the vote and could effectively and speedily replace a member if necessary.
- As far as process is concerned, we would like to again stress the importance of <u>public participation</u> in the appointment of members of the IEC by the Forum (and .its successors).

6 Definitions

"Republic" means the Republic of South Africa, including any of the Republics of Transkei, Bophuthatswana, Venda or Ciskei."

The above would suffice as definition and would serve to prevent the suggestion of separation from the RSA, which is misleading.

7 Conclusion

- If it is accepted that there must be a new political order in South Africa;
- if this is to come about peacefully;
- if elections form part of the peaceful transition;

then the results aust be accepted.

As this Act needs to be read in conjunction with the Code of Conduct for parties, the Electoral Act and the Electoral Code, we urge the Forum to make appropriate drafts available to us for comment and to contextualise our perspective of the IEC.
