MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE MONDAY 15 APRIL 1996

1. OPENING

The Chairperson opened the meeting at 08h20 and the meeting adopted the agenda.

2. MINUTES

The meeting noted the Minutes of the Meeting of the Management Committee on Thursday 4 April 1996, but deferred discussion of them until the next meeting of the Management Committee.

3. MATTER ARISING

There were no matters arising.

4. PRESENTATION OF NATIONAL SURVEY RESULTS BY CASE

- 4.1 Mr. Everatt of CASE presented the report, "Evaluating the Public Participation, Media, Education and Plain Language Campaigns of the Constitutional Assembly," tabled at the meeting as a separate document, and the document entitled, "Executive Summary," included in the documentation. The main findings of the survey were:
 - 4.1.1 **Number of people reached**: the media campaign ultimately reached 73% of adult South Africans, equivalent to some 18,5 million people. This figure was higher amongst men than women, urban dwellers than rural people, and younger than older people.
 - 4.1.2 What people learned: of those who knew of the Constitutional Assembly, 48% knew spontaneously what the Constitutional Assembly did; another 20% said it was "making laws;" only 16% indicated that they didn't know. Moreover, there was an overall faith in the process. Almost half of the respondents definitely felt part of the process and believed submissions would be considered

Embargoed until 08h00 18 April 1996 seriously; those who didn't, tended to have a wait and see, not an overtly negative attitude.

- 4.1.3 The exposure of the November 1995 draft constitution: 8% of South African adults (about 2 million people) had seen the document.
- 4.1.4 **Demand for addition information:** 82% of the respondents wanted to know more, particularly about what their rights would be.
- 4.1.5 **The cost implications**: dividing the overall costs of the process by the number of people reached, it cost R1.61 per person reached.
- 4.1.6 Mr. Everatt ended his presentation by noting that the Constitutional Assembly's media and public participation had broken through a critical barrier and penetrated into people's day to day consciousness. He queried what would happen next to meet their expectations for further information.
- 4.2 Mr. Wessels asked what media succeeded in reaching people in rural areas. Mr Everatt responded that this was complex, for each rural area had its own pattern. The most effective method was face-to-face, as witnessed in the 1994 voter education drive, which combined roving video vans and participatory workshops.
- 4.3 Mr. Moosa of the ANC requested a break down of findings by province, particularly for Kwazulu-Natal. Mr. Everatt responded that analysis of the findings was still underway. The only provincial break down so far was on whether people wanted more information. In the Northern Province, as many as 91% of the respondents wanted more information. KwaZulu-Natal showed the lowest figure, at 75%.
- 4.4 Mr. Eglin queried whether there were any findings on people's "attitude towards" the content of the constitution. Mr. Everatt responded that a full report of the findings would be available in a month.
- 4.5 Mr. Ramaphosa queried the use of race as a category. Mr. Everatt responded that, although CASE would like to drop mention of it, South Africa was emerging from an apartheid past, and race was still a factor. If one ignored it, one might blind oneself to current South African realities.
- 4.6 Mr. Green of the ACDP queried whether youth under 18 had been surveyed. Mr. Everatt responded that they had not, because it raised important moral questions around parental consent and also had important cost implications. However, there had been a suggestion that at least parts of the constitution (at least the Preamble and the Bill of Rights) should become part of the school curriculum.

5. PROGRAMME FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL COMMITTEE 15 - 19 APRIL 1996

- 5.1 Mr. Ebrahim spoke to the document entitled, "Programme of Work 15 to 19 April 1996," tabled at the meeting and reported that it had the following implications:
 - i. Contentious issues would be referred to subcommittees for solution. These would run concurrently with the Constitutional Committee.
 - ii. Other subcommittees, like the one on the Preamble, would also be scheduled.
 - iii. Discussions would close on Wednesday, 17 April 1996 to allow the completion of the Bill on Friday, 19 April 1996. Understandings reached in the Constitutional Committee after 17 April 1996 would be placed in an addendum to be considered by the Constitutional Committee when it met to consider the Bill.
- 5.2 Mr. Marais of the NP requested that provincial legislative and executive competencies be added to the list of outstanding issues. The meeting agreed that these matters still needed discussion.
- 5.3 Mr. Eglin of the DP expressed concern that members of the Constitutional Committee had not yet seen the Fifth Edition of the "Working Draft" and would need time to study it closely. The Chairperson ruled, however, that the draft would be forwarded to the Constitutional Committee, because:
 - i. The meeting would go through each provision;
 - i. Many of the provisions had been discussed on various occasions at earlier meetings; little was new; and
 - ii. The "*Programme of Work*" did not require the meeting to deal with the whole draft text this first day, but bit by bit, allowing parties to study the text further in the next few days.
- 5.4 Mr. Moosa of the ANC queried whether the purpose of the discussion would be to approve provisions for inclusion in the Bill, unless the meeting specifically decided to refer specific formulations for further discussions. The Chairperson ruled that it was.

6. DRAFT PROGRAMME FOR ADOPTION DAY - 8 MAY 1996

- 6.1 The meeting noted the document entitled, "Programme for Adoption Day," included in the documentation, but agreed to defer discussion of it until the next meeting of the Management Committee.
- 6.2 It was agreed, however, that the Constitutional Assembly Administration could continue and implement aspects of the work, in consultation with the Chairpersons.
- 6.3 The meeting agreed that the Constitutional Assembly Administration would find a more suitable word for the event, along the lines of "Constitution Day."

EXTRACT FROM THE RESOLUTIONS OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL ASSEMBLY, FRIDAY, 29 MARCH 1996

First Reading Stage

Notice of First Reading

78A. (1) The member in charge of the bill shall place the bill on the Order Paper for First Reading.

(2) The First Reading may be set down for the day on which the bill is laid upon the Table, provided members are supplied with copies of the bill before the First Reading is moved.

No amendment allowed

79A. No amendment shall be allowed to the motion for the First Reading of the bill.

Introduction of bill

80A. The member in charge of the bill, after moving that the bill be read a first time, may deliver his or her introductory speech on the bill.

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Statements on behalf of parties

81A. (1) After the introductory speech one member of each political party in the Constitutional Assembly may make a statement on the bill on behalf of his or her party.

(2) A period of debate, as determined by the presiding officer, may follow statements on the bill in terms of Subrule (1).

Bill read a first time

82A. When statements on the bill have been made on behalf of all political parties in the Constitutional Assembly who wish to be heard, and after the period of debate referred to in Subrule 81A(2), the presiding officer shall order the bill to be read a first time, without the question being put.

Committee Stage

Referral of bill to Constitutional Committee

83A. After the bill has been read a first time, it stands referred to the Constitutional Committee for consideration of amendments.

Amendments for consideration by Constitutional Committee

84A. (1) Proposed amendments to the clauses or other provisions of the bill may be submitted for consideration by the Constitutional Committee.

(2) An amendment which is out of order for any reason shall not be considered by the Constitutional Committee, and the Chairperson's decision on any question as to whether an amendment is or is not out of order, shall be final.

(3) An amendment must be in writing, signed by the proposer, and must be delivered to the Secretary not later than 12:00 on the day preceding the first day set aside for consideration of the bill by the Constitutional Committee.

(4) An amendment which has not been submitted as provided under Subrule (3) may not be referred to the Constitutional Committee except by or by leave of the Chairperson.

Amendment of bill and preparation of report

85A. The Constitutional Committee shall effect such amendments to the bill as it sees fit after due consideration of the proposed amendments submitted and found to be in order in terms of Standing Rule 84A, and shall prepare a report.

Second Reading Stage

Notice of Second Reading

86A. After the conclusion of the Committee Stage of the bill, the member in charge of the bill shall place the bill or, as the

circumstances may require, the bill as amended, on the Order Paper for Second Reading, the bill to be accompanied by the report referred to in Standing Rule 85A.

Printing of amended bill

87A. (1) If the bill is amended in terms of Standing Rule 85A, the Secretary shall cause the bill as so amended to be printed and copies to be supplied to members.

(2) The Second Reading of the bill shall not commence before Subrule (1) has been complied with.

No amendment allowed

88A. No amendments shall be allowed to the motion for the Second Reading of the bill.

Recording of number of members in favour of bill

89A. In determining the question on the Second Reading, the number of members in favour of the question shall be recorded, whether a division is called for or not, and the number of senators who vote or are in favour of the question shall in any event be recorded separately.

Bill passed in accordance with section 73(2)

Lodging of bill with Constitutional Court

90A. If the bill is passed in accordance with section 73(2) of the Constitution at the Second Reading, two fair copies thereof shall be certified accordingly by the Secretary and lodged with the Constitutional Court with a view to the certification of the text in terms of section 71(2) of the Constitution.

Tabling of amended text submitted

91A. If the bill was not passed at the Second Reading in accordance with subsection (2) of section 73 of the Constitution and an amended text is submitted by the panel of constitutional experts in accordance with subsection (4) of that section, the Chairperson shall lay such text upon the Table.

Amended text passed in accordance with section 73(2)

92A. If passed in accordance with section 73(2) of the Constitution at the Second Reading, the bill embodying the amended text shall be further dealt with in accordance with Rules 90A and 91A.

Debate concluded.

ANC forcing through constitution, says DP

THE African National Congress has been accused of trying to railroad negotiations on the new constitution by organising a R1,3 million party in Cape Town for May 8 to celebrate completion of the document – even though almost 50 highly contentious disagreements still have to be resolved.

In an angry attack on the ANC, Democratic Party leader Tony Leon said it had embarked on "a headlong rush to finish the constitution in haste, heedless of serious flaws

haste, heedless of serious flaws in its text and political obstacles in its path. The ANC is now creating a pressure cooker atmosphere to force consensus or trample over serious problems".

Mr Leon said that with at least 48 outstanding issues still to be negotiated, the ANC had gone ahead and organised a R1,3 million party to celebrate the successful completion of the two-year exercise on May 8.

"Given the contentious nature of the issues left for negotiators to resolve, we have to ask the ANC what they are suggesting," he said.

"Could they possibly hope that we will abandon our principles and surrender the fight we are waging on behalf of the citizens of South Africa to help craft a document that will guarantee and institutionalise fundamental democratic codes, so that their extravaganza can go ahead as scheduled?

"How can a 'celebration' be planned if, at this stage, there is no certainty that a two-thirds majority for its enactment will be achieved? How can a 'celebration' be scheduled before the Constitutional Court has certified the text of the new constitution, as the interim constitution obliges it to do?"

Mr Leon pointed out that earlier this week Constitutional Assembly chairman Cyril Ramaphosa had threatened to call a referendum on the new constitution if the ANC's demands on its property clause were not met.

"Yet two of South Africa's most eminent advocates have written lengthy opinions indicating serious problems with the current for-

mulation, which could lead to 'uncertainty, conflict and constitutional challenges'.

"Likewise, negotiators have not yet properly considered the unbalanced protection given to trade unions in the constitution's right-to-strike provisions.

"On the political landscape, the ANC seems quite determined to press ahead in the absence of the Inkatha Freedom Party. This, coupled with the referendum threat, indicates that South Africa might well be governed by a constitution that 30 percent to 40 percent of the population could oppose. This is a recipe for ongoing conflict," Mr Leon warned.

He said that the rand continued to fall in value and asked: "Will a rushed and unconsidered final constitution with no guarantee of the right to own property, an intransigent, intractable, strike-happy labour force and constitutional overrides for provincial autonomy do anything to bolster the confidence of investors? "

The constitution "deserves whatever time and attention is required".
