ANC Voting day workers

ANC voting day workers are very important in our campaign.

ANC voting day workers are the last ANC representatives the voter will see before casting his or her vote.

Many voters will be undecided when they arrive at the voting station. The impression they get of the ANC from our worker - and the advice they receive - are likely to be the decisive final factors in helping make up their minds.

In the Western Cape, every vote will be important. We need to make sure that every voter has a good impression of the ANC - and any advice necessary - when they go to vote.

For the voter, you - the ANC worker - are the ANC at the voting station.

YOUR BEHAVIOUR ON VOTING DAY

Make sure there is never a time when the ANC is absent from the voting station - be at the voting station at the time you promised; leave only when the next rostered ANC worker has arrived to take your place.

Make sure your behaviour and what you are wearing creates a good impression of the ANC - dress neatly; do not drink alcohol before you get the voting station, or at the voting station.

Make sure you are clearly identified as ANC - wear the ANC identification provided. (Party agents inside the voting station are not permitted to wear ANC rosettes etc.)

YOUR TASK ON VOTING DAY

Make sure every voter has a copy of the ANC voter advice provided by the ANC.

Make sure that any voter with problems or questions is directed to the information centre at the voting station.

Make sure that every voter who wants to vote ANC knows how to do so. Ask them if they need any help in voting - if they need help, offer to show them how to vote ANC.

If they are still interested:

- * make sure they have their ID or Voter Card with them;
- * make sure they know they will get two ballot papers;
- * make sure they know they need to put a X for the ANC (or Mandela) on each ballot paper;
- * show them how to find the ANC on the ballot paper, and where to make their X;
- * the poster is available to show this.

If they are genuinely unsure who to vote for:

* offer to help them.

If they do not want to know how to vote ANC:

* politely tell them we are unable to help them.

Do not waste time with people who have made up their minds to vote for some other party. Spend your time with ANC voters, and with those who have not made up their minds.

Do not waste time arguing with, or even talking to, opposing party agents or voting station workers. If you are doing that, intelligent voters are not receiving your attention!

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE THREATENED OR INTIMIDATED

If you are genuinely threatened or intimidated at the voting station, report that to the ANC person immediately in charge of our information table.

If necessary, the incident will then be reported to an ANC monitor. The matter will then be taken up where appropriate (IEC, police, ANC local/zonal/subregional office).

DON'T FORGET THE ELECTION CODE OF CONDUCT

The ANC is committed to the Code of Conduct.

All our election day activities must conform with the Code of Conduct.
