Women's rights: what are we doing about it?

Lynette Steenkamp interviews the Minister of Justice.

"MORE women for CODE-SA."

"Women must have a say in writing the new constitution."

"We need a separate Charter of Women's Rights."

"Affirmative action must redress historical backlogs due to discrimination against women."

It is enough to make any right-thinking feminist want to get in there and burn her bra.

The ANC has been quick to jump onto the bandwagon of women's rights and is exploiting its emotional potential to the full. Nationalist took the question to Mr Kobie Coetsee, the Minister of Justice: What are WE doing about it?

It did not take long to realise that actually a great deal has been done about it, particularly during the ten years that Minister Coetsee has been in the hot seat. One by one discriminatory laws have been amended or repealed to make way for better laws.

Remember the days?

Remember the days when a woman teacher automatically lost her permanent post if she got married?

Remember when a divorce almost inevitably meant a raw economical deal for the woman?

Remember when women married in community of property could not sign contracts?

These are only a few examples. The reforms that have taken place have also not been confined to laws pertaining to Whites. A Black woman married under civil law enjoys exactly the same rights as any other.

Stumbling blocks

What about customary law? The injustices done to Black women under this law are still glaring, but concept legislation is in the pipeline. The hitch, however, is the TBVC states.

Mr Coetsee explains that it is in the best interests of all that reforms along these lines be as uniform as possible throughout South Africa. There's a neighbouring government or two, it would seem, that are not quite as keen to emancipate their women as they are to lobby for human rights.

So it is, in fact, Black governments that are delaying improvements to the Black women and not the much-maligned South African government.

As far as remaining statutory discrimination is concerned, the Law Commission has been fine-combing the books and has just come up with recommendations for removing any last vestiges.

Level playing field

It would certainly appear, then, that the government has done and is doing its utmost to level the playing fields as far as women are concerned. Yet the perception certainly exists and is cuitivated by the ANC that discrimination against women is alive and well in the RSA.

How now, Mr Minister?
"Legislation alone cannot change the way society works. Centuries of male chauvenist thinking created a society where women were perceived to be inferior. Prejudices thus formed solidified into norms and values. Only education can, in time, eradicate society's way of thinking about women.

First, Third World

"The first world part of South Africa has benefitted from the general emancipation

of women to such an extent that should a woman from that milieu choose to fight discrimination she would have the media with her to rally public opinion and probably win.

"However, it's another story for the third world woman in our country. She remains caught up in such a strongly chauvenistic society that she would simply not be capable of seeking redress even if customary law were not in place. The slow education process must first take its course."

Logical explanation

The ANC connection?

Mr Coetsee comes up with a surprisingly logical explanation:

When the ANC were banned, its leaders (men) were nearly all imprisoned or out of the country. The women like Winnie Mandela and Albertina Sisulu took over the reins of the struggle. When the men came back, out went the women.

Now, when influential women are hurting from that kind of treatment, and millions of women followers are hurting from the inherent inequalities of customary law and polygamy what better tactic than to champion women's rights, offering that (feigned?) concern as a sop and slyly connecting perceived past racial prejudices of a white government with present prejudice against women?

The loudest call at present if for a Charter of Women's Rights - a bulky conglomeration of laws, private and public designed to advance the cas for affirmative action.

This charter would be in a dition to a Charter of Fundmental Rights.
