Guidelines for Demonstrations

The Multi-Party Security Force at the World Trade Centre is an impartial force, aimed at the protection and safety of all parties represented in the Negotiating Process. We are here to assist in the security of the World Trade Centre and to ensure the safety of all persons within the premises.

Therefore the following guidelines would assist us in carrying out our tasks:

- 1. All demonstrations should take place at the gates of the World Trade Centre;
- Demonstrators should not block the free flow of traffic into the World Trade Centre;
- 3. Demonstrators should not stone or damage buildings or vehicles in the vicinity of the World Trade Centre;
- 4. The Multi-Party security would welcome dialogue between itself and heads of demonstrators:
- Multi-Party security should assist leaders of demonstrations in forwarding memoranda and assisting delegations meeting the relevant people concerned.
- 6. By agreement by all the parties, delegations wishing to hand over a memorandum is restricted to three (3) persons who may enter the premises to hand over such memorandum.
