On the 8th April, 1963, there came a private detective who took me to Bellville Police Station where I was cross-questioned about Pogo. They told me that I was a member of Pogo, during the time I was working at Helmsley Hotel. I told them that I knew nothing about Pogo business. The C.I.D. asked me my friends and the people with whom I worked at Helmsley Hotel. I told him some of my work-mates and some of my friends and only to find afterwards that they were also arrested, but I couldn't know for what reason.

workers) together for a meeting. I subsequently
Nimrod Tyali addressed us.~~They~~ said that we must all
join POQO which is another
name for Pan Africanist Congress.

He told us that the aims of Pago is to do away with passes, to demand better wages and to be equal to the whites. They also said that South Africa is "our Country" and if the white Government does not agree and meet the demands of the Bantu then Pago will make war against the white people, and overthrow the white Government, and have a black Government.

None of us joined at this first meeting.

A week later Nirood Tyale and Gagela who lives in Castle St. Cape Town called at our place and called a meeting in our sleeping quarters. Both of them addressed us on the aims of Pago and urged us to join Pago.

No one joined at this 2nd meeting.

Some time later Tyale and Gagela called again and again called a meeting in our quarters. They again lectured us on Pago and their aims and we still did not want to join.

They then told us that next time they will call for the subscription fee of 25c. and

We were afraid to be killed
and told them that we
have no money and they
must come at the end of
June 1962.

At the end of June then
Nunzod Tyali came to our
quarters at the Hotel to collect
our subscription fees. I was
in the room of Freddie
Dado. Both of us paid him
the 25 c. We got no receipt.
He wrote down our names
on a pocket-book.

When he wrote our names down
I saw the names of the following
men on the list:

Nos. 7 & 8 does not work at the
Hotel. One works at a school
at Bus Stop 4, Somerset Rd.
Greenpoint and the other at
some flat in Upper Mill St.
Cape Town. I know them.
When Tyali collected our fees
he told me that I will be

the leaders of these men at the Hotel, who's names were on the list; and told me that he will tell Ishongay that he am the leader.

During November 1962 I was told by Tyali that I must again collect 25c from the Members as the fees for 1963.

I told all the men on the list but no one paid the fees.

I reported this to Tyali and he said he will go himself but I never saw him there again.

During these meetings Tyali told us to look out for weapons such as revolvers, pungas and assegais and buy them if we have the money and keep it until we get work to fight.
