MINUTES OF THE ELECTION PLATFORM COMMITTEE1. ATTENDANCE

- 1.1 The meeting was held in the 12th floor board room at Shell House on July 19, 1993, from 14h30 - 16h30.
- 1.2 It was attended by the following; Jonathan Goddem (Education), Jeremy Cronin (SACP), Albie Sachs (Constitution Commission), Tim Wilson (Health), Trevor Manuel, Leslie Dikeni (Economic Planning), Derek Hanekom (Land and Agriculture), Popo Molefe (Elections), Thozamile Botha (Local Government), Anne Vincent and Lulu Mabena (Women's League), P.M.Shuma (Secretary General's Office), Jesse Maluleke and Marcel Golding (COSATU), Lulu Johnson (Youth League), R.Mokoena (International Affairs), Billy Cobbert (Housing), Cheryl Carolus (NEC) and Ray Mabope.
- 1.3 Apologies were received from Ralph Mgijima (Health), Fink Haysom (National Constitution), Khetso Gordan (Elections) and Aziz Pahad (International Affairs).
- 1.4 The meeting was chaired by Cheryl Carolus and Billy Cobbert (Conveners of the Election Platform Committee) and recorded by Ray Mabope (Coordinator).

2. MANDATE

- 2.1 The primary mandate of the Election Platform Committee is to write and adopt an eight page popular manifesto.
- 2.2 The Election Platform Committee should provide speakers notes to ensure uniformity and coherence.

- 3.3 To agree on the writing and adoption process.
- 3.4 To agree on deadlines for producing the document.

4. MANIFESTO

- 4.1 The role of the Election Platform Committee in writing a detailed manifesto was debated in great detail.
- 4.2 It was agreed that the Election Platform Committee has a mandate to produce an eight page popular manifesto for public circulation.
- 4.3 It was decided that the work of drafting a detailed manifesto was too cumbersome and presently outside the scope of this committee as it would not fit into the required time frame and target audience.
- 4.4 It was agreed that the task of producing a detailed manifesto was not a priority function of the Election Platform Committee right now but if considered necessary, it could be considered at a later date.
- 4.5 It was said that the ANC already has a policy document, howbeit, some policy areas are either outdated or have been revised. Nevertheless, it was felt that this was not the time to produce another policy document.
- 4.6 It was noted that policy units have been established to work on detailed areas of policy and that the work of the Election Platform Committee was not to replace their function.
- 4.7 It was suggested that the various policy units may be required to produce one or two page leaflets to highlight specific areas of interest, health, housing, employment, etc.

5. OUTLINE OF DOCUMENT

Billy introduced the proposed outline which was drafted by the conveners of the Election Platform Committee. This document was accepted as a guideline whereupon the meeting added their inputs and subtractions as recorder here below;

5.1 FOREWORD Cde NELSON MANDELA

It was decided that ANC President should write the foreword to the document.

5.2 PREAMBLE CONVENERS

The agreed to introduce the document with a preamble which commits the ANC and the Alliance to a future democratic non-racial government which would be clean, accountable, transparent and free of corruption.

- b. First draft document available by . . . AUGUST 30
- c. Consultation and fine tuning during . . . SEPTEMBER

Is the document taking shape? Does it read 'right'? I find it a bit dense and laden, including the part I helped draft. It has no glow, no inner emotion. The imagery is not clear. No clear ^{visual} reference to homes, jobs, walking safely on the streets, pensions. Within its style, I found the sections ~~of~~ on Economy, Reconstruction and the Police had a more even flow than the first two.

I think we should complete
the first draft as is, and
then try a re-write with
more persuasive Zing (not
slogans!) and more memorable
lines. Inspiration yes, triumphalism no.
We will need a central thread and continuing narrative.
Some detailed observations

(not details!):

- a). References to rights for women
are shockingly weak;
- b). There is no right to strike;
- c). Land reform is not spelt out with
concreteness [Land Claims Tribunal]
or urgency;
- d). There is almost naught to
comfort believers;
- e). Policy on language and
cultural rights is obscure.
- f). Economic policy is well presented,
but too defensive.

Dear Comrades

At the National Strategy workshop that was held from 29 to 31 January a number of decisions were taken about the election campaign. All regions made inputs from the 14 regional strategy workshops to which all branches were invited.

The most important decisions were in relation to election structures and the immediate programme of work at local level.

The structures that need to be set up at local level are described on page two. One the attached A3 sheet of paper is the summary of the programme of work that was adopted in principle at the national workshop.

We would like all local areas to begin to work on the programme immediately. The programme is focused around 11 key activities; drawing up a community profile (guidelines are enclosed), setting up structures, meeting all local organisations, having a planning meeting, recruiting volunteers, house visiting campaign linked to an ID campaign, distributing media (from head office), doing research into the opposition, beginning to plan for a local office and launching the campaign in some public way.

If these task sound difficult, a training workshop will be held in your region where two people from every local area will be invited. The training workshop will explain how each task is done and manuals that describe the process will be distributed at the training workshop. The dates for the workshops are listed below; keep in touch with the regional office for details.

GUIDELINES FOR DEVELOPING A COMMUNITY PROFILE

The main purpose of developing a community profile is to better understand the people and area you work in and to use this information to sharpen the strategies and tactics we use to fight the election campaign.

There are different ways of collecting information to complete a community profile:

- a. Information from official sources; the township office, the local government planning department, the provincial administration etc.
- b. From community sources; from fraternal organisations, from community leaders, from individuals and from calling small house meetings to discuss the questions.
- c. From doing surveys and carrying out interviews with a number of people.

We suggest that all three methods are used in developing your community profile.

Answer the following questions with as much detail as you can :

1. Define the area and the boundaries within which you are working. What sub - region and region is your area a part of. Is it a urban township, a squatter community, a small town, a rural area.
2. Get a detailed map of the area which shows all the streets and even the housing units in the area: this can be bought from the township office, the local government planning department. At best draw your own map.
3. How many housing units are there, what types of housing (numbers of each type). Include hostels, squatter camps, flats etc.
4. Number of people : number above 18 yrs. If possible break it down by race, sex, educational level, income, religion, language spoken, number that are illiterate and any other information that helps better understand the people.
5. What kinds of jobs do people in your area have (factory, domestic, farm etc) Where do people from your area work : are there specific factories, farms, where they work, how many, what means of transport do they use. How many are unemployed.

6. List the main public buildings and places in the area :
Schools, clinics, hospitals, other official buildings, shopping centres, sports grounds, police stations, churches old age homes, etc. Make a separate list of all venues saying who controls them whether we can have easy access to them and how many people can fit into them.
7. List all the organisation and groups in the area, political, community based, sport, religious etc. Please find addresses and contact numbers and contact people for each one. What relationship do we have with each of them.
8. List all the influential people in the area : business people, priests, sports stars etc. These are people who may not be ANC but have influence in the area. Explain why they are influential and what is their current relationship, if any, to the democratic movement.
9. What are the most important ways in which people get and share information; which are the most popular newspapers, radio stations, TV stations and programmes in the area. How does information get conveyed within the area. List all the different ways of getting information around and say which is most effective. Is it possible to distribute pamphlets and put up posters, how many will your area need. Say how you will distribute them.
10. Where do people spend their free time : shebeens, sports etc.
11. ANC Branch : officials, number of members (other information on members), how many members are regularly at branch meetings and will be willing to play an active role in the election camapign.
12. Does the ANC have an office in the area, is it possible to rent an office that is accessible to people, how much will it cost.
13. What are the potential polling stations in the area, how far is the furthest person from these stations. What forms of transport exist in the area and to the potential polling stations, will it be possible to mobilise transport for voters on elections day, how can this be done.
14. What resources that will be needed for a campaign are available in the area; transport, printers, venues for meetings, PA systems, etc.
15. What are the main issues affecting people in the area, make a list of all the issues people seem most concerned about as we move towards democracy. What are their feelings towards government, the ANC or other parties and organisations. Has the ANC been active in taking up issues in the area, how?


