Two weeks after I was called to his office to make the statement again he begged ^{me} promising to send me back to my job again I refused telling him that it is difficult to be a witness of what I have no idea for

Another thing I did not mention about Norman Mtshoniswa, he was working in Brooklyn Soldiers Camp. He did not want to pay for the grocery, for some time, saying he was getting less money. We told him to buy his own property to save the trouble from that we were no longer being friends that was in 1962. He was also owing me 5/- he did not repay it back for along time, till I demanded on the 13th Oct 1962 after an argument he gave me the money so I left on the Oct 14th 1962 when I came back on the 6th April 1963 he never greeted me

To mention Abednego Fanele Magadla he used to ^{take} my property without asking one day he ate all the meat was cooked while he was drunk the following days I scolded him not to do it again from that he looked unhappy, but one day on the 4th May he told me that him & Norman went to drink beer that was Friday night in Harriner Street when Norman was very drunk told him that he has massaed some of St Columbas people but did not mention names



Concerning to Isaac mhlauli
when I quarrelled with Norman I heard that
he went to tell Isaac mhlauli that he is
going to call C.I.D., when I explained
to Isaac how the quarrel some ^{took} place
I understand that he was pleased
with Norman's statement as his best
friend

where I am employed in the above address on the 8th May
1963. They took me to Bellville Police Station where I was
questioned by other C.I.D. Mr Smith, if I knew anything
about Pogo and Pan Africanist Congress, or being a member
of one of the two organisations as I used to read about
the said organisations I said yes but not being
a member. They asked me if I recognised Tshongoyi and
Gogela, but I could remember Gogela alone as he
was staying at St Columbus' Home but not being
a member of the organisation. After further questions
being pleased, Mr Vanroy told me that my name must not
be mentioned if so I'll be locked in without questioning.
Mr Smith told me that I was accused by Mthoniswa
when I asked him. I was sent back to the jobs after
two o'clock that evening. I told the ^{new} I stay with
that I was accused by Norman Mthoniswa
who suddenly rose up and promised to report me
again to the C.I.D. The following day I heard that
C.I.D's came again in the 9th but I was out of other
special duty again in the 10th they came and
took me to Bellville. Mr Vanroy told me that he has
got fresh information of being told that I am the
organiser been attending meetings. After denying
all that he asked me why did I quarrel with
Norman Mthoniswa so he gave me chance to be our
