When I was arrested on the 10th May, Mr Vanrooyen said before he locked me in, if I could be the witness against the Cape Town accused ~~men~~ he could release me at that moment, so he gave me chance to think but I refused to be the witness as I knew nothing about the organisation I was then locked in.

Two weeks after I was called to his office to make the statement again he begged <sup>me</sup> promising to send me back to my job again I refused telling him that it is difficult to be a witness of what I have no idea for

Another thing I did not mention about Norman Mshoniswa, he was working in Brooklyn Soldiers Camp. He did not want to pay for the grocery, for some time, saying he was getting less money. We told him to buy his own property to save the trouble from that we were no longer being friends that was in 1962. He was also owing me 5/- he did not repay <sup>it</sup> back for a long time, till I demanded on the 13<sup>th</sup> Oct 1962 after an argument he gave me the money so I left on the Oct 14<sup>th</sup> 1962 when I came back on the 6<sup>th</sup> April 1963 he never greeted me

To mention Abednego Fanelle Magadla he used to <sup>take</sup> my property without asking one day he ate all the meat was cooked while he was drunk the following days I scolded him not to do it again from that he looked unhappy, but one day on the 14<sup>th</sup> May he told me that him & Norman went to drink beer that was Friday night, in Hannover Street, when Norman was very drunk told him that he has massed some of St Columbas people but did not mention names

Concerning to Isaac mhlauli  
when I quarrelled with Norman I heard that  
he went to tell Isaac mhlauli that he is  
going to call C.I.D., when I explained  
to Isaac how the quarrel some <sup>took</sup> place  
I understood that he was pleased  
with Norman's statement as his best  
friend

My home is at Isolo, the father of five children  
being employed by the S.A.R. New Works

Railway for 18 years. Three C.I.D. came to fetch me  
where I am employed in the above address on the 8<sup>th</sup> May  
1963. They took me to Bellville Police Station where I was  
questioned by other C.I.D. Mr Smith, <sup>that</sup> if I knew anything  
about Pogo and Pan Africanist Congress, or being a member  
of one of the <sup>two</sup> organisations as I used to read about  
the said organisations I said yes but not being  
a member. They asked me if I recognised Shongayi and  
Gogela, but I could remember Gogela along as he  
is staying at St Columbas Home but not being  
a member of the organisation. After further questions  
being pleased, Mr Vanroy told me that my name must not  
be mentioned if so I'll be locked in without questioning.  
Mr Smith told me that I was accused by Mithoniswa  
when I asked him, I was sent back to the job after  
two o'clock. That evening I told the <sup>men</sup> I stay with  
that I was accused by Norman Mithoniswa  
who suddenly rose up and promised to report me  
again to the C.I.D. The following day I heard that  
C.I.D.'s came again in the 9<sup>th</sup> but I was out for other  
special duty, again in the 10<sup>th</sup> they came and  
took me to Bellville, Mr Vanroy told me that he has  
got fresh information of being told that I am the  
organiser ~~been attending meetings.~~ After denying  
all that he asked me why did I quarrel with  
Norman Mithoniswa, so he gave <sup>me</sup> chance to be out  
now I am going to be locked in.

There are reasonable grounds for suspicion that you are a member of this banned Organization.

This, however, is a very serious matter and I warn to you to be careful what you say. You're not compelled to say anything which may incriminate you, but what ever you say will be taken down, and it may be used in evidence.
