WE ARE IN RECEIPT OF YOUR LETTER DATED 30 APRIL 1992, WITH REGARDS TO OUR PARTICIPATION. WITH MUCH REGRET WE WISH YOU TO BE INFORMED THAT WE TOTALLY REJECT THE DECISION TAKEN BY THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE WITH REGARDS TO OUR PARTICIPATION. WE WISH YOU TO BE FURTHER INFORMED THAT AT NO TIME HAD WE RECEIVED ANY QUESTIONNAIRE WHICH WE SHOULD HAVE MOST CERTAINLY RETURNED - HAD THAT BEEN THE CASE, AND IN THIS SENSE FEEL THAT WE HAD NOT BEEN ADEQUATELY CONSIDERED.

WE WILL BE GRATEFUL IF YOU WILL KINDLY ENLIGHTEN US AS TO WHAT BASIS HAD OUR APPLICATION BEEN REJECTED. WE ARE ABSOLUTELY CERTAIN THAT THERE IS NO BASIS WHATSOEVER WITH REGARDS TO NEGOTIATION AND RIGHT WING PARTICIPATION. WE ARE ABSOLUTELY CERTAIN THAT IN THE ABSENCE OF RIGHT WING PARTICIPANTS, ESPECIALLY THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY WHOM THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE WILL HAVE NO PROBLEMS IN ACCOMMODATING AT CODESA. HAD TAKEN A BIASED DECISION.

MAY WE ASK WHAT DIFFERENCE IS THERE BETWEEN OUR PARTY AND THAT OF THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY WITH REGARDS TO SELF DETERMINATION IF THERE IS ANY DIFFERENCES OTHER THAN RACE WITH REGARDS TO OUR PARTICIPATION, WE WILL BE RATHER MORE GRATEFUL IF YOU WILL KINDLY

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Perhaps

KINDLY POINT THEM OUT TO US, SO THAT WE CAN ^{PERHAPS} ACCEPT THAT THE REJECTION OF OUR INCLUSION AT CODESIA HAD BEEN JUSTIFIED. HERE ALSO WE WISH TO POINT OUT THAT WE ARE ABSOLUTELY CERTAIN THAT OTHER THAN RACE THERE IS NO DIFFERENCE WITH REGARDS TO SELF-DETERMINATION.

IN CONCLUSION WE FURTHER WISH THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE TO BE INFORMED THAT WE OF THE UNITED ASIAN FRONT HAD SINCERELY OFFERED OUR PARTICIPATION AND ASSISTANCE WITH REGARDS TO HELP SOLVING THE PROBLEMS OF OUR COUNTRY; MORE IMPORTANTLY AN OPPORTUNITY THE ONLY CHANCE FOR PARTICIPANTS AT CODESIA TO CHALLENGE AND HEAR THE VIEWS TO SELF DETERMINATION WHICH IS PART OF THE AGENDA.

WITH MUCH REGRET WE ACKNOWLEDGE REJECTION OF OUR ASSISTANCE AND IN THIS SENSE FIRMLY BELIEVE THAT THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE IS NOT IN A POSITION TO HANDLE A MATTER AS SERIOUS AS RELEVANT A MATTER OF GREAT SIGNIFICANCE AS THAT OF THE UNITED ASIAN FRONT.

OUR REJECTION WILL NOT MEAN THAT OUR PARTY AND PROPOSALS WITH REGARDS TO SELF DETERMINATION WILL BECOME INSIGNIFICANT AS IT SO APPEARS TO THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE. WE WILL PURSUE THE MATTER WITH THE GOVERNMENT AND OTHER RELEVANT ORGANIZATIONS.

OUR ONLY HOPE NOW IS THAT THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE WILL FURTHER CONSIDER OUR APPLICATION MORE SO BECAUSE OF THE ABSENCE OF THE QUESTIONNAIRE AND REVERSE IT DECISION WITH REGARDS TO OUR FULL PARTICIPATION, AS WILL BE GIVEN TO THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY HAD THEY REQUESTED TO PARTICIPATE.

Your letter of 15 December 1991 to the State President has been referred to me for attention.

The Government appreciates your concern for a new and democratic South Africa and has taken note of your concern for rightwing participation in CODESA. In this regard agreement was reached by CODESA 1 that the Management Committee of CODESA should consider the question of other participants, i.e. other political parties, political organisations and administrations not represented at CODESA 1. It was agreed that the Management Committee should attend to applications by other organisations to join CODESA, as well as other means of expanding participation in CODESA. It is therefore not the Government who decides on participation in CODESA. However, the Government believes that the negotiation process should be as inclusive as possible and suggests that you apply for admission to the Management Committee of CODESA at P O Box 307, Isando, 1600.

Lukewarm reception for 'Indian homeland' party

A DURBAN waiter's attempt at gaining credibility for a proposed political party which he claims would strive for Natal to be declared an Indian state has met with lukewarm reception from President FW de Klerk.

Mr Jayaseelan Govender, 42, of Clayfield in Phoenix, has plans to formally launch the United Asian Front and boasts the support of more than 50 members already.

Among the several aims and objectives of the proposed party are the following:

- To negotiate for Natal to become an Indian homeland with an Indian government.
- To maintain and preserve the identity and culture of Indians and guard against marriage across the colour line.
- To establish police and defence forces solely comprising Indian men and women who would guard against violence directed at Indians.
- To establish trade and diplomatic relations with other Asian countries and encourage immigration of Asians from other parts of the world.

Mr Govender said in a letter to Mr De Klerk his proposed party was preparing to participate in negotiations relating to a new political dis-

pensation.

He said without the participation of "very concerned" people in the community, the new South Africa would be nothing but a "nightmarish dream" for the majority in the country.

Mr Govender said his party's idea of forming an Indian homeland was not new but was merely copied from Pretoria which had created "African states with African governments" such as Ciskei and Transkei.

The United Asian Front, he said, would create a "super and problem-free Asian community with its own education and health systems, television, radio, and film industry".

He added, however, that when "all else" failed for Indians in South Africa, his party would negotiate and encourage repatriation of the community.

Interviewed by Post Natal, Mr Govender said although his ideas appealed to "simple minds", he was convinced there were many "so-called sophisticated" people who yearned for Indians in

this country to have their own homeland but were too afraid to say so publicly.

"I would like to get some kind of feedback from the community as to what Indians think of my proposals.

"Some people may think I am mad to suggest an Indian homeland. But this is not propagation of apartheid in reverse.

"Other communities preserve their cultural heritage. Why shouldn't Indians do likewise and safeguard themselves against being contaminated?" Mr Govender asked.

Mr De Klerk told Mr Govender that any suggestions that could help the Government in the negotiation process towards the construction of a new South Africa were appreciated.

"You are no doubt also aware of our point of view that all parties with proven support should partake in such negotiations.

"You will agree then that because your organisation is virtually unknown within the general political spectrum, an indication of your support base will be useful in the consideration of the suggestions made in your letter," Mr De Klerk said.
