## PROPOSAL FOR AN "ALL-PARTY PARTY"

Further to our discussion at the conference centre yesterday I have put down our proposals in writing and hope that you can get a positive response from your organising committee.

Five Freedoms Forum will be hosting a childrens party immediately before Codesa. One of the activities that will take place at this party will be the painting of a banner and mural directed to the leadership who will be engaged in the talks.

We are trying to emphasise the need for everyone's participation in the all party talks - and in this regard we hope to illustrate some of the children of the country's hopes and desires for a future South Africa.

A colourful banner will be produced with the words 'A message to our leaders from the children of South Africa'. On the banner the children will draw the kinds of things they would like to see in the future. We would like some of the children to present the banner as a gift to the leadership.

We would like to arrange the logistics of handing it over with you. We suggest that it be handed over at the opening of the conference and that some of the leaders be photographed with the children and the banner.

The media have shown great interest in this event and will also be photographing the production of the banner at the paint-in the previous day. The ages of the children will be approximately seven to 11 and it is needless to say that the group will be composed of children from different racial groups and that the content of the mural is unlikely to favour any political party.

Should this request be impossible to meet our back up arrangements are to invite a few individual leaders to interact with the children and to be photographed with the banner/mural. This is likely to be done on the grass outside the fence if we are not allowed to group indside the grounds.

Hi! Some extra info from S Freedoms -

Kallie suggests that we let you know where we were thinking of putting the children's banner - should the committee okay the idea -

● 1) If the children (a few) can come into the entrance hall - we propose suspending the banner <sup>from the balcony</sup> just above head height on the right hand side of the escalator as delegates enter through the main doors.

● 2) If it would be better to be outside - perhaps the children could stand with the banner, just to the left or right of the door to form an ~~attractive~~ <sup>appealing</sup> addition ~~to~~ to the ~~main~~ entrance of the delegates.

We have chatted to the artists <sup>who are doing the main backdrop</sup> & they too feel it would go well with the ~~theme~~ <sup>of their</sup> presentation.

Kallie also thought we should let you know that Zach de Beer has given us a very positive response on the idea.
