INTRODUCTION

On the 7th April 1988, Maputo, Mozambique, exiled South African Lawyer, prominent member of the African National Congress and author of the famous Jail Diaries, Albie Sachs opened his car door to begin a trip to the beach for a leisurely jog.

After the publication of his jail diary and its subsequent dramatisation, he had become something of an international celebrity as well as being a leader in the African National Congress.

A massive explosion threw Sachs thirty feet in the air destroying his right arm, embedding shrapnel in his body and causing him to lose the sight of one eye. The bomb planted by agents of the Apartheid Regime, who had assassinated his friend Ruth First, nearly took Sach's life away. Miraculously he survived.

As Sachs heals physically, he struggles mentally to adjust to his injuries and disabilities and renews his political battle. And it is a declaration of faith in the power of the spirit when, seven months after the bomb goes off, he reaches the beach and runs again.

That he survived such an explosion is astonishing: that he survived with renewed faith in the possibility of human progress and an unshaken commitment to the search for a peaceful solution to violent problems is a miracle.

For Graeae - Britain's most distinguished theatre company of disabled people - the personal becomes political in the search for common ground and solidarity. Graeae brings a special intelligence to the Albie Sachs story.

DISABLED PEOPLES INTERNATIONAL

First in Canada in 1980, then in Singapore in 1981, hundreds of disabled people from around the world overcame barriers of nationality, tradition and distance to assert their shared conviction that disabled people must have an international voice and a movement through which to take action to ensure equal opportunities and human rights for disabled people.

With this conviction and with these goals, Disabled People's International (DPI) was born. It has often been described as "the last civil rights movement".

Today, the DPI network has over 100 national assemblies, more than half of which are in developing countries. National affiliates aim to be cross impairment, grassroots organisations.

The segregation, discrimination and lack of access suffered by disabled people amounts to a form of apartheid. DPI maintains that all people are of equal value and is working to ensure a "Society for All". DPI is particularly concerned with the status of disabled women, disabled refugees and disabled people living in rural areas. It believes that universal and lasting peace can only be established through social justice and full human rights for everyone.

This year, the 3rd of December is the first International Day of Disabled Persons, an opportunity to celebrate and promote human rights for disabled people everywhere.

BIOGRAPHIES

EWAN MARSHALL - Director/Performer

Ewan is the Artistic Director of Graeae and has directed the company's last two productions, Hound by Maria Oshodi and A Kind of Immigrant by Firdaus Kanga in 1992. He trained at Bretton Hall College and has worked both as a director and as an actor. He has worked with such companies as Interplay, Theatre Venture, The London Bubble and Hoxton Hall. Film and television appearances include: Derek Jarman's War Requiem and Changing Step for the BBC.

APRIL DE ANGELIS - Writer

April worked as an actress, mainly in women's theatre and young people's theatre before writing her first play Breathless which was produced at The Albany Empire.

Since that time she has written a number of

plays including: Women In Law and Ironmistress for ReSisters Theatre Company, Me for Breakout TIE and The Life and Times of Fanny Hill for Red Shift Theatre Company.

April was writer in residency for Paines Plough Theatre Company for whom she wrote Crux.

Her most recent work has included Hush for the Royal Court Theatre, produced in August last year.

Her work for Radio includes Visitants, winner of the BBC Young Writers Festival Radio 4, The Outlander a two part serial for Radio 5 and winner of the Writers Guild of Great Britain Best Childrens Radio Programme Award 1991.

Saffron has worked as a director for The Wolsey Theatre, Ipswich (RTYDS), The Old Red Lion, Red Ladder, Moving Parts, Babel Theatre Company and the Plymouth Theatre Royal. She also spent two years as Paines Plough's Associate Director where she directed Crux at The Lyric Theatre, Hammersmith. Recently she has had a son - Harry, the most challenging production to date.

Deborah is 24, from Walsall in the West Midlands. At 16, Along with fellow students she started a Theatre Company called "K" atch 22, working in the community and the West Midlands Police Force

In 1991 Deborah graduated from ARTTS International, a multi media skill centre in Yorkshire. Since then she has worked constantly as both an Actress/Workshopper and Stage Manager with London Bubble, Talawa Theatre Company, Edinburugh Fringe Festival, Theatre Foundry and Graeae.

In addition, Deborah has participated in workshops with Beijing Opera. RSC and Black Mime Theatre's Women's Troop.

RAY HARRISON GRAHAM - Performer

Ray trained at Webber Douglas Academy of Dramatic Art. Directly from drama school he spent a season with Playpus Theatre Company.

His other theatre credits include Barbarians,

Oxford, a national tour of Sus, Macbeth and One Flew Over the Cuckoos Nest for the Northcott, Exeter, Alex in the stage adaptation of A Clockwork Orange and Les in East - English Touring Company. He played the lead in Children of a Lesser God, Oxford and Mobote in Indigo at the Almeida Theatre.

Whilst resident director for the Oxford Youth Theatre for three years he directed a wide range of productions including several of his own, Yop, a Way of Life and Breaking Free. As founder member of Basic Theatre Company, Ray wrote, directed and performed in their award winning production Gary, and most recently choreographed and danced in the National Tour of Sign of the Times.

His television work includes As the Beat Goes On and The Bill for Thames TV. He has performed and choreographed sign songs for Over the Edge, See Hear and Hand in Hand which he also co-presented. Ray also presented and helped devise D'Art for

Channel Four.

SARAH SCOTT - Performer

Sarah trained at Elmhurst Ballet School, Guildford School of Acting and the National Theatre of the Deaf, Conn U.S.A. Her first major role was in the West End where she played Lydia and later Sarah Norman, the lead role in Children of a Lesser God. After a national tour, she travelled in the USA to work with the well known deaf theatre company Musign specialising in sign song and on her return played the lead in Thumbs Up at the Unicorn Theatre.

Other theatre credits include Taking Steps - Northcott Theatre, Exeter, Children of a Lesser God - Pegasus Theatre, Oxford - a lead role in Basic Theatre's award winning production, Gary, and most recently a national tour of Sign of The Times.

Her film and television work includes Ken Russell's Isadora Duncan, Help, a profile for Thames T.V., Victoria Wood, Cinderella and Integration Street for See Hear BBC TV, and sign song performances for Over The Edge, One in Four and Channel 4's Hand in Hand which she also presented. Sarah also performed and presented on D'Art, a series of deaf performing arts for Channel 4.

HELEN GAYNOR - Stage Manager

Helen trained at The Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama and has worked extensively in all aspects of theatre - from an understudy on a West End production to overseeing the building of The Pit Theatre for the R.S.C. at the Barbican Centre. She previously worked for Graeae on the Tour of A Kind of Immigrant

Deb has worked as a teacher, stage manager, technician and lighting designer. Previous productions include Hound and A

Jenny Cane began her career at The Open Space. Jenny's career has varied through plays, musicals, dance and finally to opera last year.

Internationally she has worked in Italy, Yugoslavia, Germany and Holland designing tours for both dance and theatre. Nationally, she has enjoyed doing a variety of work at Plymouth, Birmingham, Clwyd, Leeds and the Edinburgh Festival

She has lit several national tours including Lenny Henry, Victoria Wood, Hamlet, The Cherry Orchard and Kiss Me Kate. This year has seen successful tours of The Pirates of Penzance, Ricochet, All's Wells That Ends Well, The Rivals and The Corn Is Green.

In London her work includes lighting for Dave Allen, Victoria Wood, Iolanthe, The Yeoman of the Guard, Our Country's Good, Cafe Puccini and Journey's End. Most recent work in the West End Blood Wedding - The Opera, Mad Bad and Dangerous To Know and Trelawny of the Wells.

ANABEL TEMPLE - Designer

Anabel trained at Birmingham University and the ENO Design Course with Percy Harris and Hayden Griffin.

Her design work includes productions for the Embassy Theatre - Cymbaline, The Bacchae, Twelfth Night and Measure for Measure. Work for the Royal Court Theatre includes: Rock in Water, Woman and Sisters, Chelsea Borough, Build on a Sand, My Heart's a Suitcase and Top Girls and a co-

Matt also works as a drama workshop leader and has been a researcher for Channel 4.

Working with Graeae, Matt has led drama projects, as well as being a Sign Language Communicator for projects with the Beijing Opera and the R.S.C. In the past, Matt has toured with both Hound and A Kind of Immigrant and looks forward to visiting Belarus this Autumn with Soft Vengeance
