Dear Sir,

This is to confirm my conversation by telephone when I informed you that the authorities in London see no objection in principle to your going to the United Kingdom accompanied by your mother. The authorities take into consideration that you may not be able to obtain a South African passport and may leave this country holding only an exit permit.

This information is given on the understanding that the strict legal position is that leave to land in the United Kingdom can be granted only by the Immigration Officer at the port of entry, but it is not expected that you will meet with any difficulty and it is recommended that you should carry this letter with you.

Will you please let me know at what place and on what date you expect to arrive.
